

# **Special Educational Needs & Disabilities (SEND) Information Report**

## ***Important information for Parents and Carers***



### **Introduction**

All staff at Grangetown Primary School are fully committed to providing an inclusive experience and curriculum to all children, irrespective of their needs. Working closely with parents, carers and other professionals we ensure that we are able to support children's development in their academic, physical, social and emotional needs. We offer appropriate levels of support including quality first teaching in class, small group and individual intervention outside the main teaching sessions as well as specific programmes as advised by external agencies. We also offer in-school counselling and nurture sessions led by trained practitioners.

All Sunderland Local Authority (LA) maintained schools have a similar approach to meeting the needs of pupils with Special Educational Needs and/or disabilities and are supported by Together for Children; Sunderland, to ensure that all pupils, regardless of their specific needs, make the best possible progress in school. All schools are supported to be as inclusive as possible, with the needs of pupils with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) being met in a mainstream setting wherever possible.

The broad areas of SEND need are:

- Communication and Interaction.
- Cognition and Learning.
- Social, Emotional and Mental Health Difficulties.
- Sensory and/or Physical.

### **SEND Ranges**

Together for Children; Sunderland launched the SEND Ranges in September 2019. These provide a framework for all professionals working with children, and will give clarity for parents and families in terms of what their child's needs are and what they will receive to support these. The intention is that all children within the city will receive consistent support to meet their needs. Teachers use this document to assess the level of a child's need and to identify additional support required.

Assessment within the ranges is updated by your child's class teacher in discussion with the SENDCo at least annually.

### **What is the LA Local Offer?**

The Children and Families Bill was enacted in September 2014. From this date Local Authorities (LA) and schools are required to publish and keep under review information about services they expect to be available for children and young people with special educational needs (SEN) aged 0- 25. The LA refers to this as the 'Local Offer'. The intention of the Local Offer is to improve choice and transparency for families. ## **What is the Special Education Needs Information Report?**

Schools utilise the LA Local Offer to meet the needs of SEND pupils as determined by school policy and the provision that the school is able to provide. Schools refer to this as “The Special Education Needs Information Report”.

## **The 15 questions and answers below provide for more information about SEND at Grangetown Primary School:**

### **1. Who are the best people to talk to at Grangetown Primary School about my child’s difficulties with learning/ Special Educational Needs or disability (SEND)?**

There are several staff you can talk to at GPS, regarding your child’s learning or SEND. If you are unsure who to approach, please have an initial chat with your child’s teacher. They are responsible for:

- Checking your child’s progress and identifying, planning and delivering any additional help your child may need (e.g. like targeted work, additional support) and letting the Special Education Needs/Disabilities Coordinator (SENDCo) know as necessary
- Writing Pupil Progress targets / Individual Support Plans (ISPs), and sharing and reviewing these with parents at least once each term and planning for the next term. Personalising teaching and learning for your child.
- Ensuring that the school’s SEND Policy is followed in their classroom and for all the pupils they teach with any SEND.

You can also talk to our Acting SENDCo, Mrs V Hanlon. The SENDCo is responsible for:

- Developing and reviewing the school’s SEND policy
- Coordinating all the support for children with special educational needs or disabilities (SEND)
- Ensuring that you are involved in supporting your child’s learning, kept informed about the support your child is getting, involved in reviewing how they are doing.
- Liaising with all the other people who may be coming into to school to help support your child’s learning e.g. Autism Outreach Team, Speech and Language Therapy, Educational Psychology etc.
- Updating the school’s SEND register (a system for ensuring that all the SEND needs of pupils in this school are known) and Provision Map and making sure that records of your child’s progress and needs are kept.
- Providing specialist support for teachers and support staff in the school so that they can help children with SEND in the school to achieve the best progress possible.

You are also welcome to talk to our Headteacher, Mr L McAnaney. He is responsible for:

- The day to day management of all aspects of the school, including the support for children with SEND.
- Making sure that the Governing Body is kept up to date about issues relating to SEND. The Headteacher will give responsibility to the SENDCo and class teachers, but is still responsible for ensuring that your child’s needs are met.

From January 2025, Ms S Briton will become our SEND Governor, which means that he takes a special interest in SEND, and meets with our SENDCo on a regular basis. The full Governing Body has overall responsibility for ensuring that the necessary support is given for any child who attends the school, who has SEND.

## **2. What are the different types of support available for children with SEND at GPS?**

- (i) Class teacher input via excellent targeted classroom teaching (Quality First Teaching).
- The teacher has the highest possible expectations for your child and all pupils in their class.
  - All teaching is built on what your child already knows, can do and can understand.
  - Different ways of teaching are in place so that your child is fully involved in learning in class. This may involve things like using more practical learning.
  - Specific strategies (which may be suggested by the SENDCo or an external agency e.g. Educational Psychologist) are in place to support your child to learn.
  - Your child's teacher will have carefully checked on your child's progress and will have decided that your child has a gap or gaps in their understanding/learning and needs some extra support to help them make the best possible progress. Specific group work and interventions which may be run in the classroom or outside, or run by a teacher or a Teaching Assistant (TA).
- (ii) Specialist groups run by outside agencies e.g. CAMHS, Speech and Language Therapy etc. - as per the SEN Code of Practice 2014.

Sometimes, children are identified by the SENDCo as needing some extra specialist support in school from a professional outside the school. This support may be from: Local Authority central services such as the Autism Outreach Team or Sensory Service (for students with a hearing or visual need), or from outside agencies such as the Education Psychology Service (EPS).

What could happen if your child is identified for this type of support?

- You would be asked to give your permission for the school to refer your child to a specialist professional e.g. a Speech and Language Therapist or Educational Psychologist. This will help the school and yourself understand your child's particular needs better and be able to support them better in school.
- The specialist professional will work with your child to understand their needs and make recommendations as to the ways your child is given support.

### (iii) Specified Individual support

This type of support is available for children whose learning needs are severe, complex and lifelong. This is usually provided via an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP). This means your child will have been identified by professionals as needing a particularly high level of individual or small group teaching.

This type of support is available for children with specific barriers to learning that cannot be overcome through Quality First Teaching and intervention groups ("Including All Children" documentation from LA). Your child will also need specialist support in school from a professional outside the school. This may be from: Local Authority central services such as the Autism Outreach Team or health agencies such as the Speech and Language Therapy (SALT) Service.

For your child this would mean that the school, or you, can request that Local Authority Services carry out a statutory assessment of your child's needs. This is a legal process which sets out the amount of support that will be provided for your child.

After the request has been made, a Panel of Professionals (with a lot of information about your child from school external agencies and from you), will decide whether they think your child's needs (as described in the paperwork provided), seem complex enough to need a statutory assessment. If this is the case they will ask you and all professionals involved with your child to write a report outlining your child's needs. If they do not think your child needs this, they will ask the school to continue with the current support.

After the reports have all been sent in, the Panel of Professionals will decide if your child's needs are severe, complex and lifelong. If this is the case they will write an Education Health Care Plan (EHCP). If this is not the case, they will ask the school to continue with the current level of support and also set up a meeting in school to ensure a plan is in place to ensure your child makes as much progress as possible.

The EHC Plan will outline the number of hours of individual/small group support your child will receive from the LA, how the support should be used and what strategies must be put in place. It will also have long and short term goals for your child. The additional adult may be used to support your child with whole class learning, run individual programmes or run small groups including your child.

### **3. How can I let the school know I am concerned about my child's progress in school?**

If you have concerns about your child's progress, please speak to your child's teacher initially. If you continue to be concerned that your child is not making progress, you may speak to the Special Education Needs/ Disabilities Coordinator (SENDCo). The school SEND Governor can also be contacted for support.

### **4. How will the school let me know if they have any concerns about my child's learning in school?**

If your child is identified as not making progress, or if staff have a particular concern, the school will set up a meeting to discuss this with you in more detail and to:

- listen to any concerns you may have
- plan any additional support your child may need
- discuss with you any referrals to outside professionals to support your child's learning.

### **5. How is extra support allocated to children and how do they progress in their learning?**

The school budget, received from Sunderland LA, includes money for supporting children with SEND. The Head Teacher decides on the deployment of resources for Special Educational Needs and Disabilities in consultation with the school governors, on the basis of needs in the school.

The Head Teacher and the Inclusion SENDCo discuss all the information they have about SEND in the school, including: the children who currently receive additional support, the children needing extra support, the children who have been identified as not making as much progress as would be expected and decide what resources/training and support is needed.

The child's view will be sought informally and for review meetings; this may not always be possible with very young children / children with delayed development.

Schools identify the needs of their pupils on a provision map which, for SEND pupils, identifies all resources, training & support. It is submitted to the Local Authority and reviewed regularly and changes are made as needed.

### **6. Who are the other people providing services to children with SEND at GPS?**

School provision:

- SENDCo/DHT
- Teaching Assistants / Learning Support
- Forward Steps Counselling
- Educational Psychologist employed by school
- Educational Mental Health Practitioner (Healthy Heads Team)
- Breakfast club / After school club staff
- Additional staff leading out of hours clubs or music tuition.
- Admin Assistant/DHT with responsibility for Attendance
- Additional trained staff who support school during educational visits e.g. Derwent Hill staff

- All staff in school will make reasonable adjustments to cater for your child's specific needs in line with the Equality Act 2010.

Local Authority Provision delivered in school:

- Autism Outreach Service
- Sensory Service for children with visual or hearing needs
- Language and Learning Team
- Physical Difficulties Support Team
- EAL: English as an Additional Language

Health Provision delivered in school:

- Speech and Language Therapy
- School Nurse
- Occupational Therapy
- Physiotherapy
- CAMHS
- Mental Health Support Team
- CYPS

## **7. How are the teachers in school helped to work with children identified as having SEND and what training do they have?**

The SENDCo's job is to support the class teacher in planning for children with SEND. All staff working with your child will make reasonable adjustments to support them in their day to day learning. Their needs and ways in which to support them will be recorded on One Page Profiles or identified in outcomes within Individual Support Plans.

The SENDCo attends termly SENDCo Network Meetings. These provide updates regarding current developments in SEND/Inclusion.

The school provides training and support to enable all staff to improve the teaching and learning of children, including those with SEND. This includes whole school training on SEND issues e.g. Autism Spectrum Condition (ASC/Autism) and Speech and language difficulties.

The SENDCo or Headteacher sources additional training provided by specialists in specific areas of SEN. Individual teachers and support staff attend training run by outside agencies that is relevant to the needs of specific children in their class e.g. from Together for Children; Sunderland, the Autism Outreach Team (AOT) etc.

A number of staff have specific qualifications and experience in working with children with particular, identified SEND.

## **8. How will the teaching and learning be adapted for my child with SEND?**

Class Teachers plan lessons according to the specific needs of all groups of children in their class, and will ensure that your child's needs are met. Support staff, under the direction of the class teacher, can adapt planning to support the needs of your child where necessary. Specific resources and strategies will be used to support your child individually and in groups. Planning & teaching will be reasonably adjusted daily, if needed, to meet your child's learning needs. Additional interventions may be planned to meet specific needs of pupils either on an individual basis or in small groups.

## **9. How will we measure the progress of your child in school?**

Your child's progress is continually monitored by his/her class teacher. Their progress is reviewed formally every term in reading, writing and maths. For Foundation Stage children, this is through observation and assessment using the EYFS Curriculum. All Y1 pupils complete a Phonic Skills

Check. Some children will complete this check for a second time in Y2. All Y4 children are required to complete a Multiplication Check. At the end of Key Stage Two (Y6) all children are required to be formally assessed using Standard Assessment Tests (SATs). This is something the government requires all schools to do and the results are published nationally.

Children may have an Individual Support Plan (ISP) / personal targets which will be reviewed at least termly, and a future plan made.

The progress of children with an Education and Health Care Plan is formally reviewed at an Annual Review, with all adults involved with the child's health and education. The SENDCo will also check that your child is making good progress within any individual work and in any group that they take part in.

#### **10. What support do we have for you as a parent of a child with a SEND?**

The class teacher is regularly available to discuss your child's progress or any concerns you may have and to share information about what is working well at home and school so similar strategies can be used. The SENDCo is available to meet with you to discuss your child's progress or any concerns/worries you may have. All information from other professionals will be discussed with you and the person involved directly, or where this is not possible, in a report. Personal progress targets/ISPs will be reviewed with your involvement. Learning at Home tasks will be adjusted as needed to suit your child's individual needs. Alongside the home school diary, an additional home/school communication book may be used to support contact with you, when this has been agreed to be useful for you and your child.

#### **11. How is Grangetown Primary School accessible to children with SEND?**

The building is accessible in that it is single level throughout. Access into all classrooms, halls and the outdoors is ground level and appropriate for use with wheelchairs and walking aids. We ensure, wherever possible, that equipment used is accessible to all children regardless of their needs. Staff access training in the use of more specialist equipment, moving and assisting which your child may require. Children with physical or medical needs have care plans in place. After school provision is accessible to all children including those with SEND. Extra-curricular activities are accessible for children with SEND. Please refer also to the three-year Accessibility Plan.

#### **12. How will we support your child when they are leaving this school? OR moving on to another class?**

We recognise that transitions can be difficult for a child with SEND and we take steps to ensure that any transition is as smooth as possible.

- If your child is moving to another school, we will contact the school SENDCo and ensure he/she knows about any special arrangements or support that need to be made for your child. We will make sure that all records about your child are passed on as soon as possible. The support of more specialist agencies will be sought if required e.g. Autism Outreach Team.
- When moving classes in school: Information will be passed on to the new class teacher IN ADVANCE and a planning meeting will take place with the new teacher. ISPs will be shared with the new teacher. Your child will take part in transition visits to their new class in order to familiarise themselves with their new environment and get to know their new class teacher and, where applicable any teaching assistants with whom they will be working. In some cases, a Pupil Passport or Transition Book will be made for your child, in order to help them understand and prepare for moving on.
- In Year 6: The SENDCo and Y6 teacher will discuss the specific needs of your child with the SENDCo of their secondary school. Your child will do focused learning about aspects of transition to support their understanding of the changes ahead. Where possible your child will visit their new school on several occasions and in some cases staff from the new school will visit your child in this school.

### **13. What Emotional & Social Development support do we have for a child with a SEND?**

We recognise that pupils with SEND may well have an Emotional and Social Development need that will require support in school. The Emotional Health and well-being of all our pupils is very important.

- We have an effective Safeguarding Policy in place; we follow National & Local Authority Guidelines.
- School has been allocated a Mental Health Practitioner, a member of the city-wide Mental Health Support Team, (the Healthy Heads Team) who works on site weekly
- Additional referrals to other agencies such as CAMHS or CYPS are completed as necessary.
- We have thorough Behaviour and Anti Bullying Policies.
- The Head, Deputy, and all staff continually monitor the Emotional Health and well-being of all our pupils; this may be for example, via PSHE activities such as those in our scheme: "Jigsaw", or via pupil questionnaires and the school suggestion box.
- We are a 'Listening School' with thorough Anti Bullying procedures in place.
- We have a timetable of structured activities over lunchtime for those children who require additional support.
- We have trained Playground Buddies who support their peers during lunchtimes and playtimes.

### **14. What would happen if my child has a medical need?**

If your child has a physical or medical need then a care plan will be created in liaison with parents and carers, medical professionals and any other external agency involved in supporting your child. The plan will include all relevant detail regarding care for your child, including any emergency procedures.

Staff working with your child will receive appropriate training where necessary.

### **15. Which school can my child with SEND apply to?**

If parents wish a child with SEND to be admitted to Grangetown Primary School, the school adheres to the Local Authority Admissions Policy. More information can be found on our school website.
